NEW MUSEUM NEARLY COMPLETED



At long last, a permanent, protected facility has been found in which to preserve and exhibit the significant momentos of Central Oregon's past. Hopefully, the Central Oregon Pioneer Museum in Bend will be in operation early in 1969.

Giant strides have been made in readying for museum use the old Tucker Building on the corner of Greenwood Avenue and Harriman Street, made available by the Deschutes County Court without cost. The Deschutes Pioneers Association and individuals in the area have contributed some \$5,000, and at least \$4,000 is needed to complete the project.

The additional funds will make possible the development of a caretaker's living quarters at the rear of the building, according to William J. Burton of the building committee.

"Substantial contributions have been received from a number of donors," Judge Robert H. Foley, chairman of the finance committee, reported. "If others who are interested will send in their checks, early completion will be assured."

Coordinating the details is an eightmember Museum Commission, which was established in accordance with state law, in order to utilize the property made available by the county. Claude Vandevert, representative of the Deschutes Pioneers Association, is Commission chairman. The Commission authorizes all expenditures from the building fund, and dispersals are made by the county treasurer.

Already the building is a far cry from the lava-rock shell of a few short months ago. Installation of a new front entrance with double doors, erection of a handsome sign over the front entrance and addition of new rear doors greatly enhanced the building's outside appearance.

A new cement floor has been poured. The roof has been repaired. An insulated ceiling, new lighting system and new gas heating system have been installed. Volunteer help from the Pioneer Association helped to keep down the costs and "stretch" the available funds. The Van Matre Construction Co. was the general contractor, with sub-contractors including Smith Electric, lighting; Joe McConnell, floor; and Komar Heating and Appliance, heating plant.

Women of the organization, headed by Mrs. Edna Brinson, museum committee chairman, have been helping with the fund drive by holding a continuous rummage sale Fridays and Saturdays in the building.

"Accomplishments so far are impressive," said Association president Reuben A. Long, "and with just a little more effort, we'll be over the top!" He added that contributions to the museum fund are tax-deductible.

NEW MONARCH ANNOUNCED:

Queen Gracie **Evans Grimes**

Mrs. Gracie Evans Grimes, 84, new queen of the Deschutes Pioneers Associated iation, is a life-long resident of Central Oregon. One of her earliest recollections is of crossing the Deschutes River in a cance at "Big Meadows," near LaPine when she was five years old. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jeff D. Evans, had settled on grazing land in the meadows to raise cattle. They returned four or five years later to their homestead on Ochoco Flats, where Gracie and their other six children were born.

Queen Gracie was married September 4, 1910, to William F. Mason, who, like her father, was a freighter, Mr. Mason ran a freight line from Shaniko to Prineville and from Prineville to Silver Lake, driving eight-horse teams. Later Mr. and Mrs. Mason moved to

the Redmond area and operated a dairy, milking 40 cows. Then for nine years they owned and operated the Delaware Hotel in Bend.

Mr. Mason died in 1942, and three years later, his widow married her childhood sweetheart, David W. Grimes. He died in 1956.

Mr. and Mrs. Mason had two children, Leta Giskaas of Bend and a son who died in infancy. There are two grandchildren, Mrs. Ray (Donna) Jones, Bar-stow, California, and William Giskaas, Santa Ana, California, and three greatgrandchildren, also in Santa Ana.

The new queen has two sisters, Mrs. J. M. (Leota)-Johnson, Bend, and Mrs. Roy (Lillian) Campbell, Spokane, Washington, and two brothers, Otis Evans, and Harvey Evans, Ritzville, Washington.

Mrs. Grimes was born February 9. 1884, when Prineville was the county seat of the huge Crook County area from which Deschutes and Jefferson counties later were carved.

After her parents and their family (then Gracie and one brother) moved to Big Meadows, about twice a year they made the four-day trip to Prineville by wagon for supplies. Bend was to be established some years later on the site known as "Farewell Bend."

Mrs. Grimes is a member of the Golden Age Club and the First Christian Church. For many years, she was active in the Rebekah Lodge and Grange work.

The childhood home of Reuben A. Long, retiring president of the Deschutes Pioneers Association, may be preserved as a momento of pre-homesteading days. It has been proposed to move the three-room log cabin, built on the desert probably 90 years ago, to the now nearby town of Christmas Valley.

Because the cabin stands at one of Central Oregon's early-day "crossroads," Reub's mother ran an informal inn. Since long before the turn of the century, all kinds of people had passed by there. Soldiers, miners, homesteaders, horse buyers, cattle and sheep drivers, peddlers. There were wagon tramps, on foot or on horseback— even renegades and wanted criminals evading the law.

Reub was two years old when he moved to the desert in 1900 from Lakeview, a hundred miles to the south, with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alonzo W. Long; a 10-year- old brother, Everett, and a sister, Anna, (Mrs. Leston Linebaugh) then six months old.

The cabin was an old house then. Why and when it was built—and the identity of the pioneer who hewed the sturdy logs—are lost in antiquity. Reub theorizes that the logs were hauled from the Lost Forest, which provided material for many of the early cabins on the desert.

The Longs moved straight to Christmas Lake from Lakeview, up the east side of Summer Lake, past the Thousand Springs Ranch, up the Juniper Canyon route. There is no road there now, but people went that way then, over the rough and rocky trail.

The cabin stood at the junction of two early-day roads. One was an old military route from eastern Oregon Army headquarters at The Dalles to regional Army headquarters in San Francisco (the route the Longs traveled when they came to the desert.) The other was an old military and miners' road from Jacksonville via Fort Klamath and east to Fort Boise.

The Yreka Trail, which miners used after gold was discovered near Canyon City in 1862, to go from the California and Nevada mines to the John Day "diggin's," passed three miles north of the cabin.

Another early road passed about 20 miles to the north. It led from The Dalles to Shaniko and Prineville, southward to Silver Lake and on to Lakeview. For many years wool was hauled in big wagons to Shaniko on this road, after the railroad was built to Shaniko.

In the homestead era-from 1906 to about 1915—little towns began to spring up everywhere, and the Long cabin was right in the center of things. Within a distance of "a couple of looks," as Reub likes to say, there were such promising new towns as Fremont, Lake, Sink, Fleetwood, Connley, Arrow, Buffalo, View Point, Cliff and Loma Vista. Reub's mother was the first postmaster at Lake, and his Aunt Anna Long the first postmaster at Sink. All of 2 towns are gone now—in some cases with no sign a town had ever been there.

But the rugged old Long cabin has been able to survive the ravages of time and the elements, and except for a sag in the roof, is still in reasonably good condition. History-minded Central Oregonians hope that it can be preser-
