This book is designed to work with the Hillside Pioneer cemetery index published by the Clatsop County Genealogical Society in March 1988.

Researching that project left me with a great deal of information that would not fit into the index format. This book evolved from that material.

The newspaper microfilm collection at Astoria Public Library is the prime source of this information. In some cases the particular issue that an obituary would have been published in is missing. I was able to find enough information from other news items or other books to compile a short biography. These entries are marked with a *.

I checked the Deed Index Book A at Clatsop County courthouse for records of cemetery lot purchases. This is not proof that the person who purchased the lot is actually buried there. He could have sold or given it to a friend or other family member.

I also went through the card file for Oceanview cemetery looking for removals from "Hillside " or the "old cemetery ". Sometimes I found I had more information than these records, where the card said "Burial Date - unknown."

I have tried to cross reference family connections that were obvious to me . Some surnames, such as Johnson or Erickson, there is not enough information for me to do this, but this may be possible if you are tracking a particular family member and have other clues.

The book is divided into four sections:

Section A.....identified by block and lot

Section B.....names in the sexton records

Section C.....obit identifies this cemetery

Section D.....connect to a family there or died during time Hillside was in use.

Block 1 lot 3

James Harvey

14 May 1880

Justice Ben B. Turley, acting coroner, yesterday summoned a jury to hold an inquest on the body of a man found drowned in the river off Scarborough hill and brought up by James Doyle, fisherman who testified to the finding of the body and its being brought to the city by him as found. Charles Turk, being sworn, stated that he recognized the deceased as James Harvey, that on the 28th day of April he went up with him to Megler's cannery and Harvey then engaged to fish for Megler and Co. The jury found that the deceased was proved to be James Harvey, a native of Ireland, aged about 30 years and he came to his death by accidentally drowning on or about the 3rd of May. From appearance of the body, it is evident the poor fellow was preparing for a struggle for his life when engulfed in angry waters of the Columbia River on the night of the storm. He had succeeded in removing his heavy boots and one arm was disengaged from his flannel shirt.

A.C. Slippen

5 May 1880

The body which was brought to Astoria yesterday by the steamer Quickstop is supposed to be the remains of Mr. A.C. Slippen, whose loss was noted in the Astorian of the 23 ult., when he attempted to go from Astoria to Deep River in a small boat. He leaves a family in Washington Territory. The body was found floating, standing erect in the water, the breast, shoulders and head just above the water, his hat still on. The remains were taken in charge by officers at the morgue.

Fortunati Lavavelli

27 April 1880

Yesterday afternoon the body of Fortunati Lavavelli, a boat puller in the employ of Booth & Co., was brought to the undertakers for preparation of burial. Lavavelli went out to fish with his companion as usual on Tuesday night and while taking up the net yesterday morning he suddenly gave out, telling his companion that he could pull no longer. He was told to take his oars out and having called for a drink of water his companion passed it to him. He took a mouthful of the water, but spurted it back out, and fell over a corpse. Coroner B.B. Turley was summoned after the body was brought in and the verdict of the inquest was that he died of apoplexy. Deceased had no relatives here. He was a native of Italy.

Old Mr Allen, for many years a resident of Chinook was brought to St. Mary's hospital Saturday night very low and not expected to live long. His affliction is of the heart.

19 September 1880

Old Mr Clark died at St. Mary's hospital yesterday . He was one of the survivors of the Peacock disaster in 1841. For many years he was "handyman" for Commodore Watson.

John Anderson

28 September 1880

The body of poor John Anderson, ship carpenter from the Belle of Bath, was found floating in the bay on Sunday. An inquest was held by coroner Franklin and the verdict of the jury was death by accidental drowning. Anderson was missed from the ship on the night of the 19th. It was generally supposed that he had deserted, to jump advance wages in some way, and warrants were issued for his arrest. Little did others suspect the whereabouts of the man they were hunting for, that he had entered a port where no civil process of law could by human hand be served. He was safe in a haven of eternal peace. How quickly sentiment changed when the body was found and it became known that the poor fellow had not deserted his post of duty. There is a moral in this instance, of deep significance to those who are too apt to fix censure (sic) where it is not deserved, consigned to dishonor the purest of character upon the "breath of suspicion." And there is another moral to be drawn from it. When Anderson was last seen his associates were of that nature which were calculated to lead to much conclusion as were formed after his death. He leaves no relatives here we know of. He was a native of Sweden.

Joseph Anderson

7 August 1880

Captain Ben Johnson found a body identified as Joseph Anderson, stevedore and fisherman, native of Ireland, age about 44 years. He drowned on or about the first of August.

Charles Whalley (Whalbey?)

10 August 1880

A sailor named Charles Whalley, age 30 years and a native of Finland died of consumption on board the bark Harrison G. Johnson on the 7th inst., while she lay in Bakers Bay. His remains were brought to this city yesterday and buried in the cemetery.

Mattie Piper (Taper? or Paper?)

13 August 1880

The unfortunate woman known as Mattie Piper was found by Henry Turner, proprietor of the Ore Fine Saloon, yesterday afternoon in the bed of her room over the saloon in an unconscious condition. She died at 6 pm. An inquest was held that indicated Miss Piper had been drinking earlier and said she wanted to drink herself to death, but then said she knew a quicker way. We're informed by Chief of Police Berry that Mattie received telegram on Wednesday from a Seattle man named Jakey Wirty, with whom she had cohabited for a long time and he had taken up with another woman. She asked another girl in the same house to get her morphia, but was refused. We suppose she got it herself. She had resided in Seattle, W.T. and owned a saloon there.

Mrs S.M. Cole

14 May 1880

Died in upper Astoria on the 14th inst., Mrs. S.M. Cole. The funeral will be held in Congregational church today at 1 pm.

John Francis

3 June 1880

The body of a drowned man was found floating near the Farmer's dock yesterday by Captain Phil Johnson. It was conveyed to the undertakers where Coroner Turley held an inquest on the body which was identified as that of John Francis, a Russian Finn, aged about 40 years. The inquest not being concluded we have no further information

4th June

- a majority verdict that deceased came to his death by violence at the hands of person or persons unknown.

Chief of Police arrested John Christianson and Lawrence Lasson at the cannery of Badollet & Co. on suspicion of murder of John Francis.

5th June

- testimony says a fight ensued over a card game, where harsh words were said to a female witness. The victim was under the influence of liquor and left the gathering first. Loud words were heard outside when the the prisoners left.

There not being enough evidence, the prisoners were released.

Larry Turner

25 January 1881

Larry Turner, proprietor of the Oro Fine on Concomly street in this city dropped dead behind his counter yesterday morning about 3:00. He appeared to realize that his time had come, as his last words addressed to a few friends who happened to be in the saloon were "I'm going, boys." The funeral will be from the Ore Fine today at 2:00 o' clock.

Addie May Douglas

20 May 1881

Removed to Oceanview 8-3-1917

The stricken parents, Mr and Mrs John Douglas and the grandparents, Mr and Mrs Dr Kinney have the heartfelt sympathy of the people of Astoria on the death of their little child Addie May Douglas. The funeral took place yesterday. She was the child of John and Abby A. Douglas, 3 years 6 months 17 days of age. She died May 15th.

John Burke
Emma Burke
10 June 1879

The bodies of Mr Burke and his daughter were taken charge of by the
Hiberian Society, under whose auspices the funeral was conducted on
Sunday afternoon. Rev. Father Orth preached the funeral sermon. About
3 o'clock last Saturday afternoon the lifeless bodies of Mr John Burke
and his daughter Emma, aged about 17 years were found by Mr Abbot in
Clatsop under the most shocking and painful circumstances. Mr Abbot was
driving along the road in the vicinity when he came to a fallen tree
and stopped the team to see a way of getting around it when he found
the bodies. The inference is that Mr Burke was chopping down the tree
and his daughter was watching the act. When the tree fell it hit a dry
stump which fell on Miss Burke. Mr Burke came to her assistance and
himself was struck by a falling limb. On Sunday the bodies were brought
to Astoria by the steamer General Canby and the funeral was held at the
Catholic church. They were buried in the city cemetery. He went east
just a few months ago for his daughter and made their home on Clatsop
Plains.

In Memoriam

John Burke served in the army during the war of rebellion and
participated in 46 encounters from Bull Run to Appomattox. He was born
in Cedra, Tipperary, Ireland about 1829, went to New Orleans about
1850. He enlisted in 1861 and married. His wife was a widow of a
soldier named Wallace. She was the first woman to enter the city of
Mexico after the Mexican war. Mrs Burke died after the war at Harper's
Ferry, and is buried there. John Burke came to Ft Stevens in 1865 and
homesteaded the place where he met his end.
Miss Emma was born in Camp Upton, Vir. In 1865 her father placed her in
a convent where she had been until recently.

31 June 1879

In searching the premises of the late Mr Burkner at Clatsop a few days
ago United States bonds to the amount of \$3000 with the coupons for
1880 were found sewed into the garments worn by the daughter

9 July 1879

Silas Smith, administrator for the estate of Mr Burke, found \$300 in coin under a cracker box in the room where the girl slept. Bonds amounted to only \$1800 principal, not \$3000 as reported earlier.

Luigi Serra

30 November 1889

Luigi Serra dropped dead on the street at 6:30 last evening. He had gone from his house to Captain Ferchan's on business and when almost in front of his house on West 6th street sank lifeless to the ground. He was immediately picked up and carried home, and medical aid summoned to no avail. He had long suffered from heart disease, but of late had been feeling better. Deceased was a native of Madalina, island of Sardinia near the Italian coast, age 39 years. He was born Nov 10, 1850 and leaves a wife and three children. His aged father, 84 years lives in the son's birthplace. He had been a resident of Astoria about 12 years, proprietor of Serra's restaurant, prominent among his countrymen, respected and liked by all. He was a member of Beaver Lodge No 35 IOOF and the Alert H. & L. Co. and belonged to the Masons in Italy. His sudden and sad death was an occasion of profound grief to his sorrowing friends and family. The funeral will be tomorrow at 2:00 in the afternoon under the auspices of the Odd Fellows and firemen.

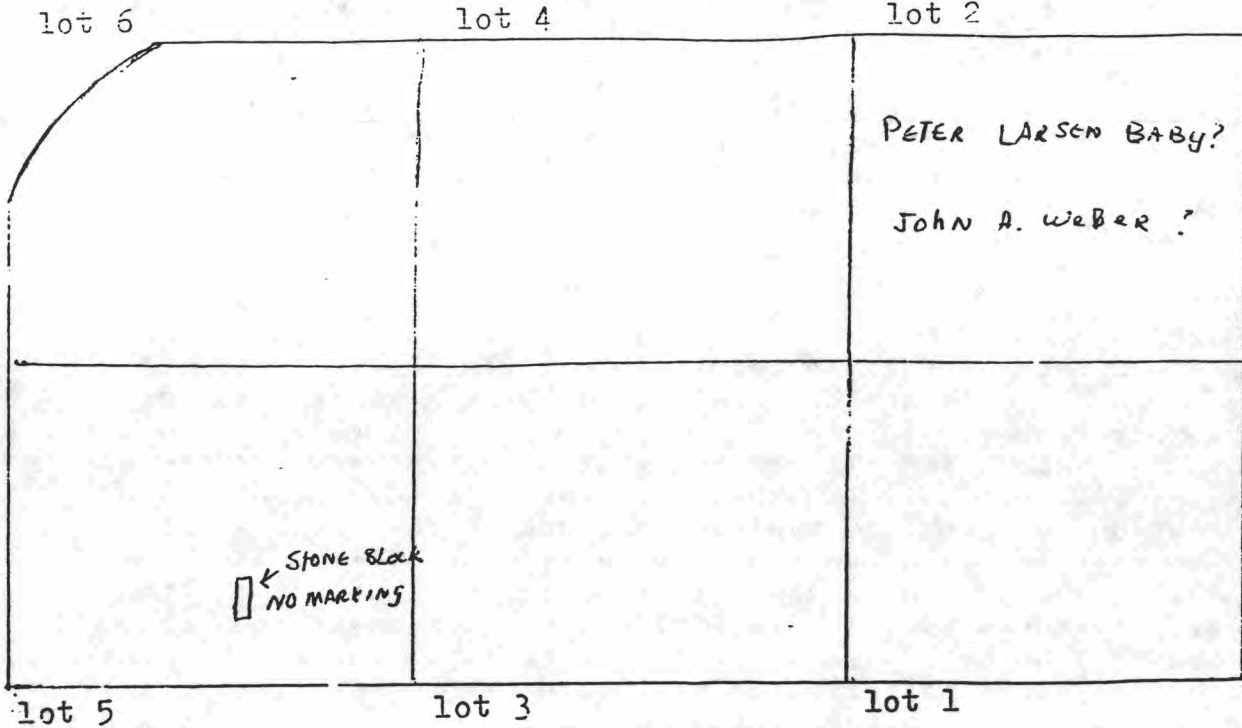
H.T. Dennis

21 September 1880

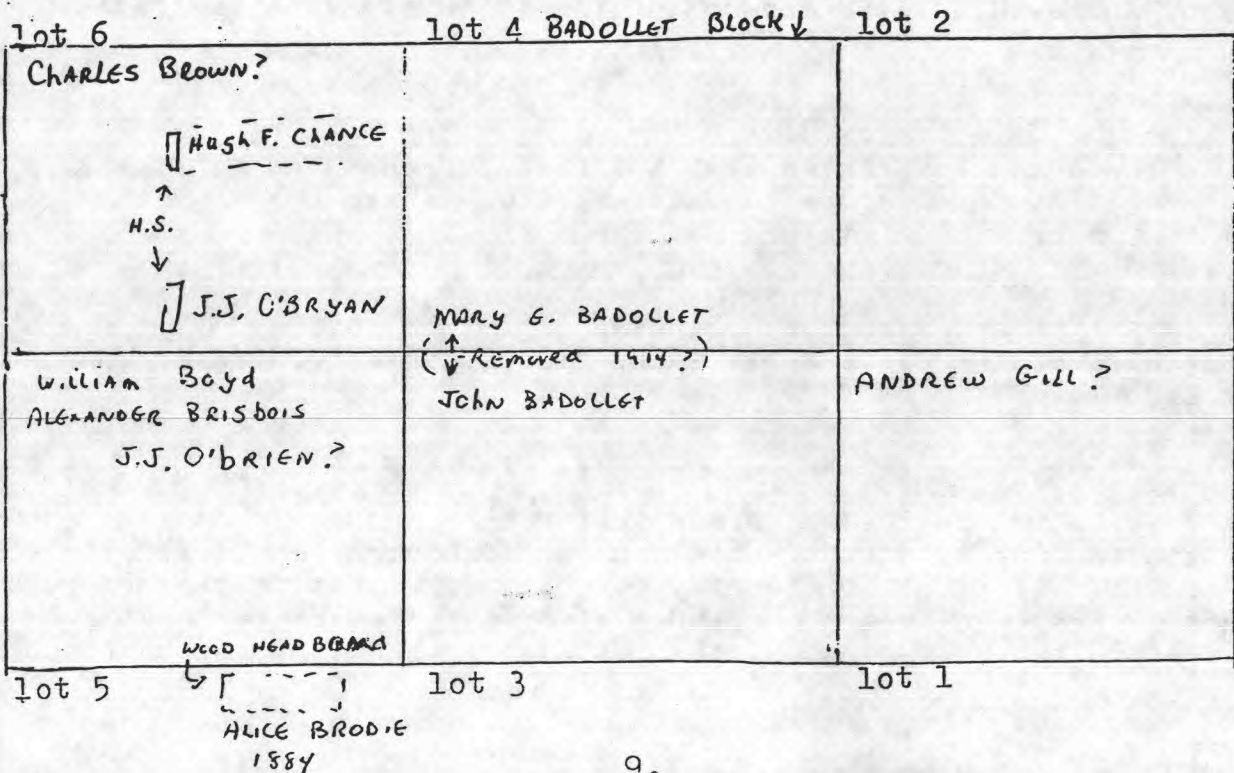
The sudden death of Mr. H.T. Dennis of John Day on Saturday last, is a matter of sincere regret. He was beloved by all. He had been on the streets of the city an hour before his death, in apparent health and took the mail from the post office for Fern Hill, and some purchases which he had made at the stores and started homeward bound in his boat. The boat was picked up afloat in the bay that evening about 9 o'clock and poor Henry Dennis was found in it a corpse. An examination before the coroner revealed the facts that his death was caused by heart disease. He leaves an aged mother, a sister and a brother and numerous friends to mourn his sudden departure. The funeral was largely attended in this city yesterday.

Andrew Gill

21 June 1880

We regret to announce that the report in circulation yesterday of the drowning of Andrew Gill and his boat puller proves to be true. Mr. Gill's brother, John, who is also engaged in fishing returned to the city Wednesday night about ten o'clock and states that Andrew and his boat puller Alec Chase put out with their net early Tuesday morning and drifted down on the ebb tide making the mouth of the river at slack water. When then, as is often the case, a heavy swell set in very rapidly and where but a short time before the surface of the water was only moved by a gentle ruffle the waves began to break heavily and Mr John Gill says he saw the boat capsizing in the breakers near the swash channel after which his brother and Chase gained the boat and he saw them clinging to the bottom of it. He immediately put to their rescue, but before he could reach them another breaker tossed the boat over and over, after which he saw nothing more of either of the men. John Gill made for Sand Island and remained all day in hopes of securing their bodies, failing which he came to town with the sad news. Both men were much respected in the community. Mr Gill leaves a wife and parents behind who have the sympathy of all in thier bereavement.

On Friday afternoon, Aleck Brisbois, while working on a jam of logs in the Walluski fell between the logs and was drowned. The unfortunate man was a French Canadian about 28 years of age. His remains were brought to this city last evening for interment. His death being purely accidental Mr Franklin did not consider it necessary to hold an inquest.

Died in Astoria July 7th at 2:35 of brain fever, Hugh Fleming Chance, age 19 years 10 months 20 days. He was the son of postmaster William Chance, an efficient assistant to his father in the post office, courteous and obliging. He was virtually and emphatically a pioneer and one whose name will be long remembered by all who knew him. Peace to his ashes. He was born in Sullivan, ME. Oct 31 1808, emigrated to Columbia, Ohio in 1836, married in 1838, moved to Iowa in 1840, Oregon in 1845, Astoria in the spring of 1849. His daughter Mary Columbia was the first white child born in Astoria.

18 November 1884

Louis Eckert, a German, aged 25, fell from a scow at Hanthorn's cannery yesterday morning and was drowned. He was employed by Andrew Shuring to unload wood and had but lately come down from Coeur d'Alene mines. A strong ebb tide was running and it is hoped the body will drift ashore. He was a member of Castle Lodge No 62, K of P of Red Bluff, Cal.

Feb 27 1885

The body of Louis Eckert was found. He was a native of Germany, age 32, K of P. Funeral this afternoon.

14 November 1883

Died in Astoria Nov 14th, infant son of Mr and Mrs F.B. Elbertson.

Emerson (Amundson?)

16 October 1885

Jno. Emerson was drowned at upper Astoria about half past five yesterday afternoon under peculiar circumstances. He was standing with three or four other men on the dock of Fisherman's Packing Co.'s premises when someone called to him that his boat was loose. The boat was only a few yards from the shore and the wind was setting it in. 8 July 1881

A man named Alexander Faust died suddenly in his bed at his room in Astor House block yesterday morning. He had just returned from fishing and eaten breakfast and immediately went to bed. 3 June 1881

The first officer of the British ship Eiler Bank, John R. Foster, a native of England was found dead in his bed on board on Saturday afternoon. At the request and expense of the captain of the ship an inquest was held by Coroner Franklin. Last spring he was taken with measles which resulted in severe bronchitis affection. He was a native of Ohio and for many years navigated the waters of lake Michigan. He leaves a wife and several children. Deceased was a member of Ocean Lodge No. 200 F & AM, Pentwater. He will be interred by Temple Lodge No. 7 today. He was age 64.

Matthew Gridiron, colored man, late cook on the Highland Light, died in the hospital last Thursday night of pulmonary troubles. He was buried yesterday.

Feb 1883 Removed to Oceanview 5-1907

* Captain Jackson Gregory Hustler came to Astoria on Christmas Day 1849. He was born in New York city, where his father was a captain of one of the first packet boats which ran between New York and Liverpool, in 1818. J.G. went to sea at 13 years of age aboard the North Carolina, later was a midshipman on the Independence. He was also in the U.S. Navy. One of his trips ended in California where he was one of the many searching for gold in 1849. He soon tired of shoveling gravel and bought one of the many idle ships laying in the harbor in San Francisco. He sailed for Astoria in the schooner Mary Taylor, which he used for many years as a pilot boat. On 27 May 1852 he married Eliza Jane McKean and they had two daughters, Mary and Margaret.

The Captain retired from pilot work in 1859. He served as the city treasurer for 6 years, county clerk for 4 years and spent more than 30 years as a school clerk. During Ben Holliday's heyday, J.G. was in charge of the Main street Dock in Astoria. He helped organize the first fire department. (History of Columbia Valley)

30 May 1885 removed to Oceanview 1910

Every flag in the city was at half mast in respect to the memory of Irv. Stevens, whose death is felt as a personal loss to many who will never look upon his kindly face again. He had been ailing for some time, but the rhematic fever sapped his life away at half past three yesterday afternoon. He was born in LaSalle Co., Ill. and came to Oregon with his parents, Chas. Stevens and his wife who have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement. He was a pilot on the ocean steamers between Portland and here. He was a good husband and father, leaves a wife and two children. The sad news will be read with sincere regret by a large circle of friends whom the deceased had endeared to her, by many neighborly acts of kindness and who deeply sympathize with her husband and children in their bereavement. Services held at the Baptist church.

Vincent

26 May 1885

On Sunday morning Wm. Chance and Wm. Clinton, while passing down a gulch on the other side of West 8th street, towards Young's river, found part of a human body lying in the brush, rank vegetation growing over it almost concealing it. The coroner was called and inquest held which elected the fact that he was Robert Vincent, who mysteriously disappeared Jan. 20, 1884. A bundle of papers and an empty demijohn was found by the body. G.W. Metlery, a neighbor testified to the boots, papers and demijohn was in his possession on the day of his disappearance. Vincent lived alone on his ranch for the last seven years, had been married but his wife died. He leaves two sons, one on the London police force and one keeping a photograph gallery in London. Several years ago Vincent froze his feet and suffered with the effects. Robert Vincent was a native of England, about 56 years of age.

Died at Pendleton, OR., Mr. C. Wallman, formerly the proprietor of the Centennial Hotel, Astoria. He was a member of Astoria No. 1. Despite overcast sky and slush underfoot yesterday afternoon a large procession formed at the residence of the late Chas. Wallman, to accompany the body to the grave. Mrs Wallman arrived Sunday evening with the remains of her husband. The entire fire department turned out preceded by the Young Men's Western Band.

His father resides in Norfolk, England, of which place the drowned man was a native.

It would be a good idea for flags to fly at half mast today in the memory of Mr Conrad Boelling.

Mr Conrad Boelling, an old and honorable resident of this city, died last Sunday evening of paralysis. He had two strokes in the last year and a few days before his death expressed a belief that he would have a third, which he believed would be fatal. Deceased was born in Germany in 1803, came to this country in 1845 and arrived in Oregon in 1847, and in Astoria in 1849, being a continuous resident of this city for the last thirty six years. Moses Rogers. Mrs Flavel and her children are now in San Francisco, the rest of his children and grandchildren are in the vicinity. Funeral will be from Grace Episcopal church at 2:00 this afternoon. High mass for the departed soul will be held at the Catholic church, after which the body will be interred at the hillside cemetery.

The death of Alfred Crosby took place yesterday in the family residence at 7 o'clock and was not unexpected. Deceased was born in this city December 1st, 1853, was one of genial temperment with a wide circle of friends. On Nov. 9, 1888 he left on a trip to California which did him no good, returning last week, only to die. The funeral will be from Grace Episcopal church at 1:30 tomorrow afternoon. Sunday afternoon, one of Oregon's noble pioneer women was laid to rest in the long sleep, at Hillside cemetery. Mrs. Laura Ferrell, who died March 4, at the home of her son, Ferdinand, in Vancouver, Wash., is mourned by hundreds of friends who knew her in life as a kind and sympathetic mother, companion and friend. She had become quite feeble in late years from a complication of ailments, but the immediate cause of death was heart failure. The deceased was one of the early pioneers of the Pacific coast, having crossed the plains with her father from Geauga co., Ohio in 1847. Later with her husband, she settled near Astoria, on the Lewis and Clark river, where the greater part of her life was spent. Mrs. Ferrell, like many others who endured the hardships and privations of pioneer days, was a woman of sterling qualities and untiring industry. She was the mother of fifteen children, eight of whom survive her.

The remains of Mrs. Ferrell were brought to Astoria for burial. The funeral services being held Sunday at the Methodist church, where a large concourse of people gathered to pay their last respects to the dead. The sermon was preached by the Rev. J.J. Walter, and the services were most impressive throughout. The pall bearers who bore the remains to the Hillside cemetery were, Judge F.J. Taylor, B. Van Dusen, C.W. Shively, Charles M(?) Brown. V. Bolling and C.S. Wright.

At the grave the services were conducted by the Pioneer and Historical Society of Oregon. Judge J.D.H. Gray, president of the society made an address. Her kind and patriotic work, together with her husband Ferdinand Ferrell, who died several years ago, and beside whose grave we place her, is well remembered by many now present.
