

## Violet "Pat" Dickman

Violet Jean "Pat" Dickman died of complications from an upper respiratory infection at a Eugene nursing home on Saturday, Feb. 26, 2005. She was 80.

Born November 1, 1924 in Terrebonne, Ore., Pat was the second of seven children born to parents Ray and Lucille (Wilson) Holgate. She

attended grade school in Mountain Home, Idaho, before returning with her family at the age of 14 to Terrebonne. After attending high school in nearby Redmond,

Pat married Bob Dickman in Silverton on May 29, 1943. While Bob was in the service she resided in Portland, and worked at Meier and Frank in the hat department. When Bob returned in 1945 from the service, they resided in Prineville until 1968 when they moved to Albany, where Bob managed the new Les Schwab Tire Center. In 1973 Pat started her ceramic shop, Pat's Putter n' Paint, which she operated for almost 20 years. In 1998 Pat and Bob moved to Salem.

Pat was a member of Prineville First Baptist Church where she was active in choir, children's ministry, social ministry and the Christian Women's Club. She was a member of North Albany Baptist Church from 1968-1998, where she was also active in the Christian Women's Club.

In 1998 she became a member of Salem First Baptist Church. Pat and Bob were also members of Thousand Trails, loved traveling and

camping, and enjoyed many trips to the coast with friends. Pat made various crafts, including ceramics, needlepoint, knitting, crocheting, and enjoyed trying any new craft that came up.
