OFFICERS AND EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBERS 1968

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The following is a letter from one of our members in Los Angeles, California which throws a little more light on the Caldwell History published in our Spring Issue:

Dear Mrs. Lacy:

Thank you for p 17 on "Caldwell Ancestry and Descendants" of the RVGS Quarterly Sping issue. I was most interested in the material. In my genealogical collection I have a similar piece on the Caldwells which I shall include in this letter from notes of Mr. Craig Walter Green, formerly of the New York World newspaper which he collected for his book, "Two Naval Captains of the Revolution, Being a Sketch of Capt. John Green, Sr., and Captain James Craig, Jr., and their services to their country in war and in peace."

First of all, in reference to certain dates which should be noted in the last paragraph on page 17 of "Caldwell Ancestry and Descendent" from the letter contributed by Mr. Inlow.:

"About the year 1400" the three Caldwell brothers, so noted in the letter, were successful in relieving Spain and Lisbon of pirates operating in that part of the Mediterranean. They "received \$20,000 each from Frances First of France."

According to the encyclopedia, Frances I of France was King from 1515 to 1547. Perhaps the year was more like 1500, or well into the 1500's?

There were two James the First's, one James I, King of Great Britain 1603-1625, but also "King of Scotland from 1567? He lived from 1566 to 1625. The second James the First of Scotland lived from 1394 to 1497, but was actually King of Scotland 1424 to 1437, fourteen years. As I read the encyclopedia, I wonder which of these applies to the story? Of course Queen Elizabeth, I's reign was 1558-1603 and, I believe, Oliver Cromwell went to the north of Ireland 8/13/1649 to 5/1650, as far as I can determine. So the dates do help to understand how many generations are being spoken about. (Actually I should have reversed the two James above).

The notes about which I spoke are as follows: "CALDWELL":

1. John, 2. Alexander, 3. Oliver Caldwell. Three brothers, sailors, who sailed from Toulon, France, in the latter part of the 14th century (1500'). They fished along the Mediterranean. Ancient seals show that the name came from "a well".

Driven from France in the time of Francis I, they settled in Scotland where they bought an estate from Bishop Douglass, near Tolney Frith by the consent of James I. They agreed that when required each would send a son and 20 men to aid the King.

Six Cauldwells (the old spelling of the name) went to Ireland with Oliver Cromwell.

By the way, Oliver Cromwell's grandmother was Ann Cauldwell. (Your Spring issue says his mother. After the "Restoration" (1660-1688), three fled to America: (the notes continue with no explanation).

1. David Caldwell
2. John Caldwell (see below, his son "John Caldwell")
3. Alexander Caldwell
4. Joseph Caldwell died in Ireland.
5. Daniel Caldwell remained in Ireland through several of his children came to America.

1. John Caldwell who is the son of John #2 above married in Derry (London-derry), Northern Ireland to Margaret Philips and had several children. He came to American in 1727, landing at New Castle, Delaware and going to Lancaster and in 1724 to Virginia. (Ed note: couldn't be right must have been 1734 to Va.) His son, William Caldwell was father of Marthya Caldwell, who was the mother of John C. Calhoun.

2. James Caldwell born in County Tyrone, No. Ireland in 1724, came here with his kin in 1769. He married in 1752 Elizabeth Alexander born in 1737, a descendant of the Bruces of Scotland and a member of the same family that settled Alexandria, Va. James Caldwell settled finally at Wheeling, Ohio Co., Va. (Now W. Va.) where at the time of the Revolution he was active as a civil officer though too old for war service. His eighth child Elizabeth Caldwell b 1765 married Robert Williamson. Their daughter Mary Williamson became wife of the Rev. Wm. Henley, father of Elizabeth Henly b 11/30/1804 in South Carolina, who married John Smims Green b 11/30/1794, Bucks Co., Pa.

Note: For a sketch of the Caldwells with their Coat of Arms and a picture of the Castle Caldwell in County Fermanagh, N. Ireland, which the family occupied, see the American Magazine of History 1909."

This ends Mr. Green's notes. I couldn't help but note the remarkable similarity in the ones you published as I said before.

In my own search, I discovered the book "History of Greater Wheeling and Vicinity" by Charles A. Wingerter, V. II, published 1912, pp 636,7,8. In the material, he tells about Judge Alexander Caldwell, son of James and Elizabeth (Alexander) Caldwell (see above) who came to Wheeling Creek" in "the year 1772". On Page 638 is a list of the children of Alexander and his wife, Miss Eliza Jane Halsted, of Perth Amboy, N.J.

I have a list of the children (fourteen) of James and Elizabeth (Alexander) Caldwell, as well as they are listed on the D.A.R. papers of Miss Elizabeth Minerva Green, National Number 76741, Vol 77 p. 280, my great aunt.

I got nowhere trying to look up the reference to the American Magazine of History, 1909., perhaps there is an easier way to check on the Caldwell Castle.

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THE FOLLOWING IS THE SPEECH GIVEN BY DR. FRANK HAINES AT OUR RECENT CONVENTION:

Gold brought the first settlers into southern Oregon and it is not in appropriate to remark that southern Oregon today is a gold mine for the historian and researcher. Though many of our documents have been taken out of the region to such places as the Yale University Library and the University of the Pacific and others have found their way into the dusty recesses of the University of Oregon Library basement, we are still richer in resources than most other areas of Oregon.

A major resource is always the newspapers of the region. While we are missing many volumes of our local papers and some of them have disappeared with scarcely a trace, we still have large holdings. The most complete of these is the Ashland Tidings, founded in 1876, which is available on microfilm in the Southern Oregon College library and the Ashland Public Library. Another important early paper is the Democratic Times of Jacksonville. This is also available on film at the college library, though some volumes are missing. The first of our newspapers was the Table Rock Sentinel, later the Oregon Sentinel. This is available on film at the college library where all known copies have been gathered together.

Before leaving the subject of early newspapers, I should like to make a few remarks about using them. You all know of the announcements of marriages, births and deaths. I should point out that one of the most fruitful sources of information is the advertisements. Doctors, Dentists, lawyers placed "cards" in the papers. Businesses advertised. The legal advertisements can also give interesting information.

Nor are our local papers the only ones that contain valuable information. Through 1860 the Oregonian has frequent items of news from southern Oregon and the college library has this complete on film.

Some of our county records have been turned over to the museum in Jacksonville. Others were gathered in and saved from burning by a group of three young men in 1921 and taken to the University of Oregon where they repose in bins in a dusty corner of the basement of the library. One important holding here are the only surviving volumes of mining records. Lengthy excerpts from these have been printed by the late George Vern Blue in the Oregon Historical Quarterly for 1922.

Another fruitful source of information are the records of water rights. A volume of Jackson County water rights has been published. I do not know of a library that has this volume but copies are available in private hands and one assumes that local title companies would have copies.

Which brings us to volumes to title registers. They can be most helpful and are available in the county clerk's office on film and in the offices of some of the local title companies. Probated wills are frequently saved and can make untangling family relationships easier and also make fascinating reading--a knotty problem in pioneer Oregon where the death rate caused all sorts of family amalgamation, especially since widows were much sought after.

One of the most useful sources of information is the account book of a local business. The Jacksonville museum has a fine collection of such account books from many early businesses in all of the communities of the county. Many of these books have a separate page for each customer and one can learn a good deal about a person from a perusal of his account with an early merchant. There is a need for expansion of the museum collection and any ledgers that you find should be turned over to the museum, at least for filming if not for permanent display. Ledger collections are most valuable and most useful when they are in a single location, thus permitting cross referencing.

One source of local history that must be checked is the many volume set of western history put together by Hubert Howe Bancroft, pioneer San Francisco book-seller and publisher. There are two volumes of Oregon History in the set. These volumes

present many names and most of the information is carefully footnoted. Bancroft and his associates interviewed dozens of pioneers and got many of them to write reminiscences. These were then titled and are referred to in footnotes. The collection of manuscripts is in the Bancroft Library of the University of California in Berkeley where the staff is exceedingly helpful. For those of you who, as myself, cannot always afford a trip to the Bay area, the library will provide Xerox copies of the manuscripts for a reasonable fee. Since forty pages is about maximum for most of the reminiscences, the total expense is not great.

There is no need, really, to tell genealogists about cemeteries of Jackson County but it is so rich in old cemeteries that I cannot resist mentioning them. Just the search for the cemeteries can be a fun filled task while the gravestones frequently provide drama as well as history. My own two favorites are the old Sterlingville cemetery and the well known Jacksonville cemetery. But there are literally dozens of others scattered throughout the county.

A final record that must be mentioned is the volume of Oregon post offices that has been compiled. This lists the dates of founding and the names of the first postmasters. I finally, like the Mounty, "got my man" in this volume on one occasion.

I hesitate to mention this last item as I am sure that none of you will find a relative in the pages of this set (unless it might be a relative of your husband or wife). The Jacksonville museum has a nice set of Justice court records from Jacksonville. Dropping the facetious, many names are to be found in these volumes as people availed themselves of the services of a justice of the peace for many respectable items of business.

A final item, one of almost last resort, is the filmed collection of papers from the University of the Pacific that is to be found on microfilm in the Jacksonville Museum. If you find your man, it is a worthwhile search. I would leave this set to the last.

Southern Oregon has always been a history-conscious area. The available resources testify to this. Your local libraries and the Jacksonville museum contain other resources than those I have mentioned. Term papers by students, anniversary histories of churches, anniversary editions of newspapers, pamphlets. The list is almost unending.

The gold is there. All you have to do is find it.

We hope this will help some of you who in your researching have come across these places and needed more information on them. Don't forget that the School is a good place for research, the Intermediate Education Department.

I. General rules of notekeeping

- A. Be systematic, but according to your own personal tastes. Do not adopt one system blindly.
- B. Avoid pencil, if possible, for more permanent, neater notes.
- C. Avoid incomplete entries and uncommon abbreviations.
- D. Do not write on the back of or on scraps and unusual sizes of paper.
- E. Do not be too brief or wait until later to record your data in an organized way.
- F. Leave room for filing space along left margin.
- G. Above all, identify each source properly, and restrict yourself to one page per source.

II. Search forms.

- A. Feel free to make notes on working pedigree and family group charts.
- B. Keep a calendar of search and correspondence as a table of contents as to what's been done and as a guide to future searches.
- C. Feel free to use a variety of forms patterned after the actual record sources searched for easier filing and to make sure you extract all pertinent data in a useable form.
- D. Summaries of searches done in a particular record category by place, surnames extracted, and years covered can be useful.
- E. On all calendars and extracts, include; type of search, surnames extracted, who did the search and when, the actual sources searched with full reference to call and page numbers, and the time period covered.

III. Two general filing procedures

- A. Have a manila folder (regular or legal size) for each family group you are working on to be filed alphabetically by husband's surname.
  1. Include in this file a work family group of the problem and a pedigree showing where it fits into the overall picture.
  2. Have calendars showing exactly what has been done with a reference or extract number to the results which can be filed chronologically after them.
  3. Keep a miscellaneous file for the overall picture or data which is not yet classifiable. Feel free to keep cross references or duplicates of material in other folders which may also be concerned.
  4. Once a problem has been proven and completed, file that sheet in your Book of Remembrance, transfer the working material to the miscellaneous file until you are sure they are no longer needed, and close that file.

## WORLD GENEALOGY MEET

In January The Genealogical Society of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints announced that a worldwide convention and seminar for genealogists and genealogical organizations will be held in Salt Lake City next year.

The Diamond Jubilee Conference, to be held during the same year as the 75th anniversary of the Genealogical Society, will be conducted Aug. 5-8, 1969, in the Salt Lake County Civic Auditorium complex (Salt Palace). The Genealogical Society was founded Nov. 19, 1894.

Dr. Theodore M. Burton, vice president and general manager of the Genealogical Society, which will sponsor the conference and seminar, said preliminary estimates show that 20,000 to 25,000 genealogists from throughout the world will be in attendance.

"The objective of the conference will be to promote unity and cooperation between genealogists and those who supervise the genealogical records of the world," Dr. Burton said.

In the near future the Genealogical Society will send invitations to genealogical societies and archivists to attend the conference. Planning committees will also be named.

"We plan to ask renowned genealogists and scholars to give papers, to have exhibits and booths prepared by interested commercial companies who supply computers, cameras, filing systems, reading machines, etc., and by publishing houses for the genealogical trade," Dr. Burton said.

He also pointed out that in connection with the conference, tours will be planned to places of scenic interest in and around Salt Lake City. Activities are contemplated for wives and children while business sessions are being held. A fellowship banquet and other attractions connected with large assemblies are planned.

Adequate hotel and motel facilities are available. It is possible that special tours may be arranged from Salt Lake to Zion and Bryce National Parks, Grand Canyon, Hoover Dam, Lake Powell, Flaming Gorge and other scenic attractions.

Dr. Burton said he hoped some type of "worldwide genealogical organization could be set up during the conference." Such an international organization could be a great asset to continued progress in genealogical research, he said.

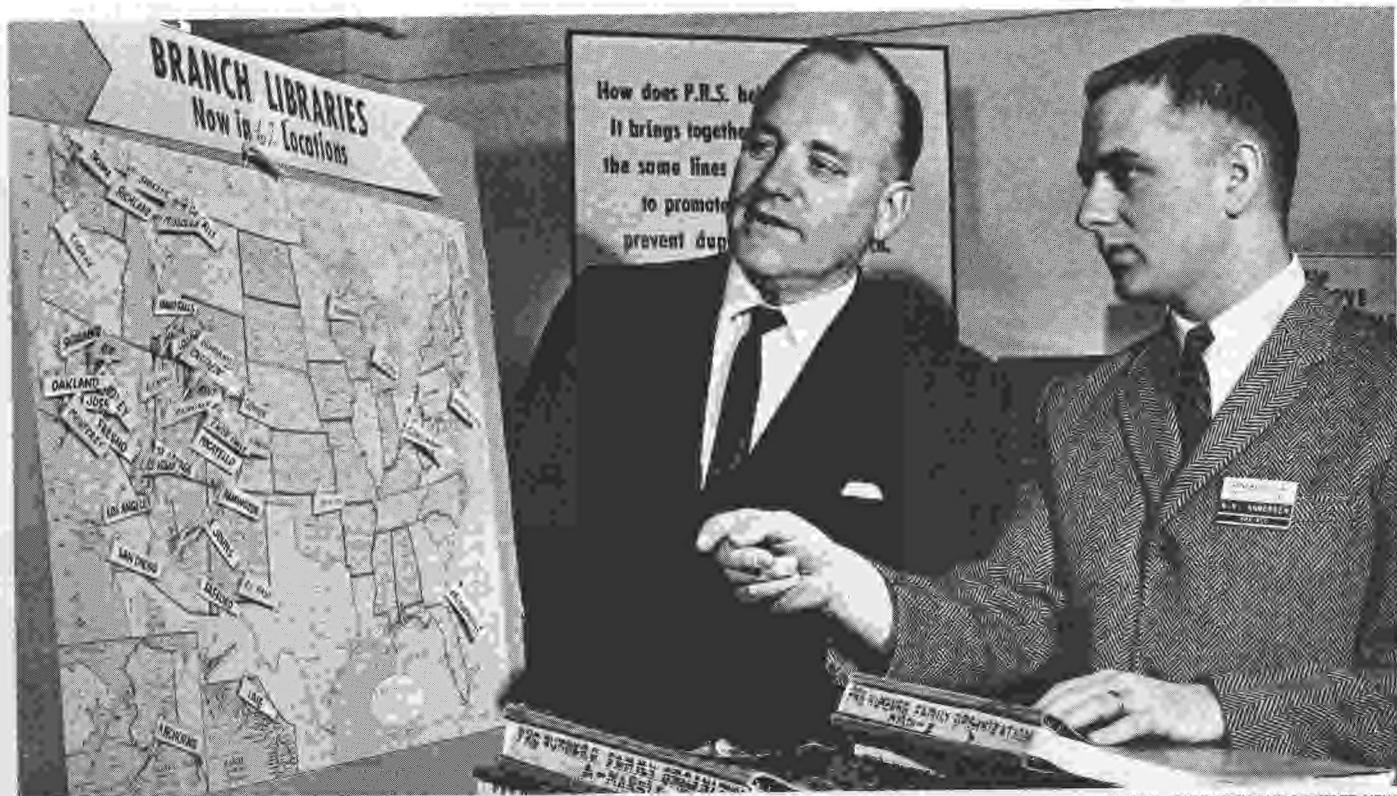

## PRS REVISIONS IN FORCE

Major revisions are now effective in the Pedigree Referral Service of the Genealogical Society, including the elimination of a charge for inquiries when no information is obtained.

In making the announcement, Dr. Theodore M. Burton, vice president and general manager of the Genealogical Society, said as a result of the changes a substantial increase is expected in the number of people who use the service.

The PRS file contains over 730,000 surname entries registered by nearly 32,000 persons and family organizations. Since the program was inaugurated about four years ago researchers have been invited to register. Inquiries have been processed since Nov. 1, 1965.

Anyone may make an inquiry to obtain the names of individuals working on their research lines. Persons need not be registered to make inquiries although it is recommended. There is no charge for registration.

Two types of searches are made in the PRS file. The computer file may be searched for the names of persons who have registered the same surname in a county during the requested time period. The computer file may also be searched for all surnames within a town. For each surname inquiry, if one or more names and addresses are found, the Genealogical Society will bill the person making the inquiry \$4.

The cost for a search of the PRS file should not be paid for in advance. A charge is made only when one or more names and addresses of PRS registrants are

obtained, and inquiries producing results will be billed through the mail.

The Genealogical Society has produced a simplified four-page PRS instruction booklet, and new simplified PRS inquiry forms are also available. The booklet is free and can be obtained by writing the Genealogical Society at 107 South Main Street, Salt Lake City, Utah 84111. PRS registration and inquiry forms are also available at no cost.

## PEDIGREE REFERRAL SERVICE

PRS works on a "pigeonhole" principle. Have you ever gone to the post office to ask for general delivery mail? Did you notice how the mail is sorted alphabetically and placed in little pigeonholes waiting to be claimed? PRS works in this manner, except that the pigeonholing is done by computers and the facts are stored on magnetic tapes. To give you an idea of how the program works, imagine such a post office arrangement and picture yourself going to a clerk and asking for all the names and addresses in the box labeled: ATKINSON, from Plymouth County, Massachusetts, during the period 1750-1850. The clerk then hands you the names and addresses of all other persons who have come in and made registrations containing this information, which

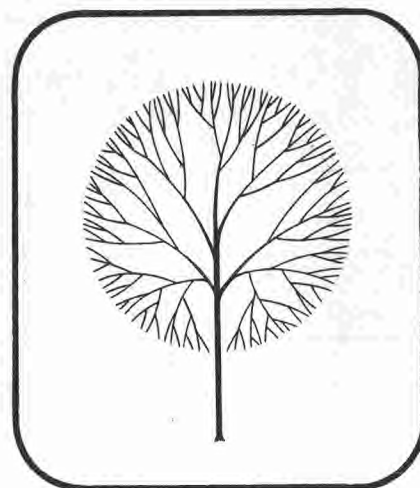
were later sorted into this particular box. Of course, PRS registrations and inquiries are made in a much more modern and efficient manner, thanks to the amazing abilities of today's space-age machines, but the old-fashioned principle behind the operation is as down to earth as sorting mail.

It can be easily understood that the more registrations there are, the greater are the chances there will be names and addresses to obtain. If there are no names and addresses in the "pigeonhole," this simply means no one has yet registered the surname you are looking for from the particular locality and period of time, but there may be many persons whose names and addresses could be obtained if only they would register.

- B. Break pedigree into smaller pieces by geographical locale with a miscellaneous file showing the surnames involved in the area.
  - 1. Keep all pedigrees, family groups and calendars concerned all names in that one, small geographical area in the one miscellaneous file.
  - 2. Then subdivide by principle sources in further manila folders or ring-binders. Under each source, you could further subdivide by places and surnames.
- IV. Use the Book of Remembrance as a depository for pedigree and family groups which are proven complete and correct.
- V. Have miscellaneous file containing all work copies of pedigrees and family group sheets found so that if you decide to work on another line or wish to do several together, you'll always have the basic notes with you.

Excerpts of The Systematic Approach to Genealogy given by David Pratt at BYU Education week in Klamath Falls.

- I. What do we look for in Genealogy?
  - A. Names for the appropriate time period in the last known area with which our ancestors were associated in order to prove:
  - B. Our relationships to the persons identified, their parentage and family groupings, so that we could select our starting point with:
  - C. All the lines from the same small, geographic area which have been worked on the least where a new, foreign language is not involved, and records are available locally; but it might be wise to first :
  - D. Verify existing data by starting a survey from your great grandparents or about 1850 or the emigrant ancestor to the general area where his descendants now live.
- II. How do we conduct genealogical research effectively?
  - A. In cycles of analysis and gathering which depends on getting a good start and:
  - B. Knowing the background of your area or its history, geography, and jurisdictions that:
  - C. Produce sources which you should know by their time coverage, content, and availability in order to:
  - D. Evaluate whether enough has been done to solve a problem which depends on a knowledge of primary and secondary sources and experience.
- III. When and where do we do genealogical research:
  - A. In the first phase of gathering which is called the Survey in order to:

1. Find out what's been done to avoid duplications
  2. Determine the extent of and assess personal and family records.
  3. Determine the extent of and assess the work already done.
  4. Determine the extent of and search available printed, secondary sources.
  5. Determine the most likely origins of migrating ancestors before starting research.
  6. Determine the extent of and how to use the original sources available in the local library.
  7. Map out a research plan to be carried out in the local library's holdings and by correspondence, accordingly the sources to be searched in any survey should include:
    - a. The home - your own materials and data in the possession of relatives
    - b. The Pedigree Referral Service-a mechanized introduction by the Genealogical Society to family and home sources of others who might have the same surnames and place of interest.
    - c. The Temple Records Index Bureau - an index to all the endowments performed in this Dispensation which should be checked through the Genealogical Society on request forms for all of your lines of interest.
    - d. The Church Records Archives - all of the family group sheets filed at the Genealogical Society since 1942 wherein at least one person was dead and needed his endowments.
    - e. The Card Catalog - check your local library and the Genealogical Society for records pertinent to the places from whence your ancestors came and more particularly, the following sources of advanced research.
- B. In the second phase of gathering or Research where the major sources to be checked are:
1. Vital records - birth, marriage and death records recorded by:
    - a. national, state, county, and town governments
    - b. Church records which often record either the data or ordinances which can be used in lieu of vital records. Those who had relatives in the I.D.S. Church before 1900 should always consider the following special sources of that church as the last part of their survey phase or the first research phase to be undertaken before going extensively into the major record sources, including records of other churches:
      - i. Early Church Information and Miscellaneous Marriage file (1830-1930) - a hodgepodge of data arranged alphabetically by surname in card file form.



- ii. European Emigration Card Index (1849-1885, 1899-1925)- family groups in card file form, alphabetically arranged by surname for those who traveled to America under L.D.S. sponsorship. If positive, search the actual shipping lists for additional data including the last known address in Europe.
  - iii. Utah Immigration Card Index (1847-1868) - family groups in card file form, alphabetically arranged by surname for those who crossed the plains under L.D.S. sponsorship.
  - iv. Patriarchal Blessing Index (1833-present) individual cards arranged alphabetically by the name of the recipient of the blessing, giving that person's vital statistics and where and when the blessing was received.
  - v. Original temple records (1840-present) - the baptisms performed by pioneer ancestors may reveal new names and places, consider the Nauvoo card index (1840-1846).
  - vi. Ward and branch records (1830-present) try to establish your ancestor at least in the first ward or branch record where he joined the church.
  - vii. Additional L.D.S. sources which might be applicable, but are more selective or fairly modern include: Church Census (1914-1960) for locating ward records; Obituary Index (1847-present) for Salt Lake newspapers; pioneer cemetery records; missionary index (1830-present); deceased membership file (1941-present); Journal History index (1835-present) as a last resort to date your ancestor at a given place; and certain secondary, printed sources such as PIONEERS AND PROMINENT MEN OF UTAH, MILLENNIAL STAR, HEART THROBS OF THE WEST, L.D.S. BIOGRAPHICAL ENCYCLOPEDIA. etc.
2. Census records - national and state head-counts which usually give family groupings, ages and birthplaces so that they can either guide you as to where to look for vital records or be used in place of them as a last resort.
  3. Court records - actions by national, state, county, district, town, and church levels for probate, civil and criminal problems which might give ages, relationships, birthplaces or geographical places associated with the family.
  4. Land records - transfer of land recorded in national, state, county and town records especially valuable in tracing migrating families.
  5. Military records-national, state & county units may give a soldier's personal background.
